

# Scholarships

Outside scholarships are another way to help cover your remaining balance. Outside scholarships are any scholarship not given by the school you plan on attending. You can find scholarships that apply to any community you are a part of. Some examples of these communities are the LGBTQ+ community, a race based community, or the disabled community. The Point Foundation's Flagship Scholarship is a scholarship for LGBTQ+ students. This foundation also has a BIPOC Scholarship for students of color.

## **High School & Local Scholarships**

Many high schools will give out their own scholarships to students. Many local businesses also give out scholarships to high school students in their area.
